About Galway and the Food Chemistry Laboratories

Galway

Galway is situated on the mouth of the Corrib river on the west coast of Ireland with a current population of approximately 86,000. It is approximately 800 years old and was the only medieval city in the most western province of Connaught. It is a centre of culture in Ireland with many theatres, cinema's music venues, sporting activities and pubs. The University plays a central role in the city and a large percentage of the population of the city are students.

In recent years the area has also become well known for attracting high tech companies mainly in the IT and Biotechnology.

There are many pubs and restaurants scattered throughout the city's narrow cobbled streets serving a range of local cuisine and food from many places around the world. From Galway there is easy access to the wild Atlantic way which runs the length of the west coast and the city is also a gateway to Connemara which is the largest Irish speaking area of the country.

Food Chemistry Laboratories

Food Chemistry is one of seven divisions of the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine Laboratories. The division is situated in Backweston Laboratory complex just outside Celbridge in Co. Kildare and about 18 km from the centre of Dublin. The division consists of five laboratories covering a range of food chemistry activities from pesticide and veterinary residues to chemical elements and dairy compositional analysis. These laboratories carry out analysis on a range of food commodities on the Irish market using a range of techniques with particular expertise in the area's of chromatography and mass spectrometry. Samples are taken from the Irish market according to a multi-annual control plan and covering a wide range of food commodities. This work is carried out to ensure Ireland meets its obligations under EU law.

The fifth laboratory of the division is the Pesticide Formulations Laboratory which analyses samples of plant protection and biocidal products for a range of parameters. The laboratory has a long history of collaboration with CIPAC going back to the nineties. The main function of the laboratory is the analysis of these products from a quality control point of view to ensure that the products meet the authorisation specifications. As well as its primary function the laboratory has developed profiling techniques using GC-QToF and FTIR-ATR for the detection of illegal and counterfeit products in support of the registration divisions at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine. The laboratory was one of the leaders in developing multi-active methods for the analysis of pesticide products to improve the efficiency of quality control analysis.

The Pesticide Formulations Laboratory was a founding member of ESPAC and the inaugural meeting of that group was held at the Food Chemistry laboratories just outside Dublin.

All of the Food Chemistry laboratories are accredited to ISO 17025 and they all operate a flexible scope. The division hosts 8 National Reference Laboratories covering pesticides, veterinary medicines and chemical elements.
